John Hudak wrote on the Chaski forum in Feb. 2008: "This engine started out as a partial set of Friends/Yankee castings purchased from Marty Knox. I started off building it per the Yankee prints but soon changed my mind, wanting to build it a little more to scale. After I had the slide-valve cylinders mounted, I decided to go with piston valves. I had a set of Yankee Hudson cylinders, so I fit them onto the frame. I had to add about 1/2" to the top surface of the new cylinders, where the smokebox mounts, because on the design of the tanker the boiler sits higher. The only Yankee tanker castings I ended up using were the drivers, smokestack, brake mounts, and front bumper beam (with some modification, like the polling pockets). Everything else was fabricated.

I'm still a couple of years away from finishing it, as I got burned out working on it so much. So I set it aside and went on to something else. As soon as I get my latest project running on air (a B&O C-16 Docksider), I'll get back to work on it."

Patrick Hosford wrote 2014: "My Dad took this photo around 1975. The loco was then running at the Pheasant and Quayle Railway, a private track in Victoria then being used by the "Vancouver Island Model Engineers" (VIME). The locomotive was then owned by the local hobby shop owner, who then sold it to someone in Nanaimo. It surfaced once more in 1986 when it was loaned to the BC Provincial Museum for an exhibit of the last spike. I've never seen it since, but would love to try and get my hands on it."

"In the early 90's, I met Jack Hewitson at the track in Winnipeg and had an interesting discussion about the loco. If I recall correctly, the CPR found out he was building this in the 50's (no, I believe that was 1939-40 - wy) and the company asked him to finish it off in time so they could borrow it for display at an exhibition in New York. He was allowed to bring it into work so some of the work was actually done in Angus Shops, and it was painted in the paint shop."

"This loco has functioning scale-sized turbo-generator with a pressure regulator to keep the lights at constant brightness without burning them out! Also a scale-sized duplex boiler feed pump and steam brakes. Water feed is by axle pump and emergency pump below the cab floor."

Steve Bratina wrote on the Chaski forum in January 2011: This "Niagara first went to Larry Smith of the Finger Lakes club. Here the crown sheet was toasted and Larry and Harold Crouch changed the stays in the firebox. It then went to Ken Hill in Ontario. It was up at the McJannett's ground level 1" track where it had a roaring coke fire and no water in the boiler. I have seen pictures of it sitting in the grass after the fire was dumped. I bought it next and was going to rebuild it. I remember that the old stays from the first repair were still in the boiler rattling around. I had the frame up and running on air and even took it to the Finger Lakes LS track to show. Later I realized it was way too heavy for any high line track at our club, so I eventually sold it. It was reportedly sold again to a gent in Texas."



When the guy pulled it out, I knew it was my old Niagara. So I sold off some full-size steam engines and brought the old girl home. She is in rough shape and needs work, but the plan is to have her back to form for the PVLS (Pioneer Valley Live Steamers') 60th." (in 2011)

The Big Boy will be superheated with 4 stainless superheaters that extend to the back of the firebox. It will also have automatic boiler pressure control with boiler pressure modulating the two-part propane control valve that feeds the burners. I have built the burners and they work, but I still have to make the control valve."

"I have made the shield with the numbers 4004, but I am seriously considering making a new one with the number 4014 to match the Big Boy that is being restored. The shield is cut using a 0.030" dia. cutter with CNC."

"The level of detail is amazing when you consider this was only Kundt's second locomotive."
