





Cap built the wheels and axles, then passed it on to me around 2010 along with the boiler which comes from an unknown Carl Purinton locomotive, but has almost the same dimensions as the Angus boiler with the exception that it has a slightly deeper firebox and the boiler therefore is set about a 1/2" higher on the chassis than in the Angus plans."

"Cap passed the engine to me, as I was working on the 'Frodo' project (the five 0-4-0s being built by myself and four others) with the intent that we could make a sixth set of parts for the running gear that would fit on the Atlantic (Charlie P's 0-4-0, 4-4-2, 4-6-0, and 2-8-0 share the same cylinders, running gear and boiler). So that is what was done. Any parts either not yet existing, or not made from the Frodo project I made myself in my home shop. The domes and smokebox front used here are actually Coventry 0-6-0 castings bought from Friend's models."

Walschaerts, copper boiler, tender is plywood. A film on YouTube shows the loco running at Jay's private track on 4 Sept. 2017.


