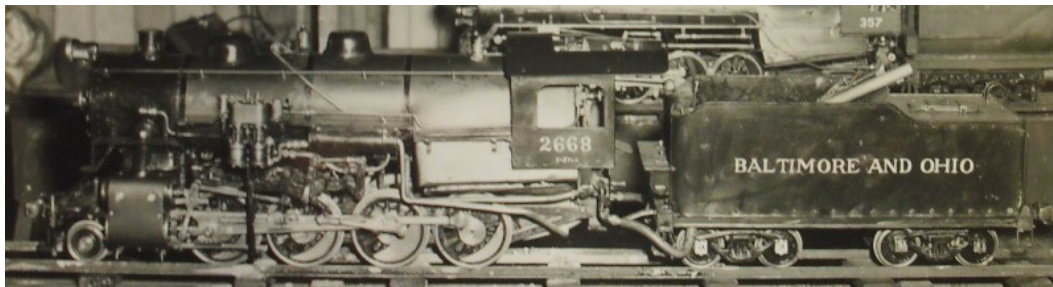

The following year he was running a new 4-4-0 #999. He also has an 1870s-style 4-4-0 in this directory. His name was also spelled "DeSantis".

Bob Hornsby wrote on the NELs webpage: "If you were fortunate enough to have a DeSantis-built (sic) locomotive, you had a high-quality and authentic engine. Frank's engines were mostly scratch built." Frank began building locos in the 1930s.

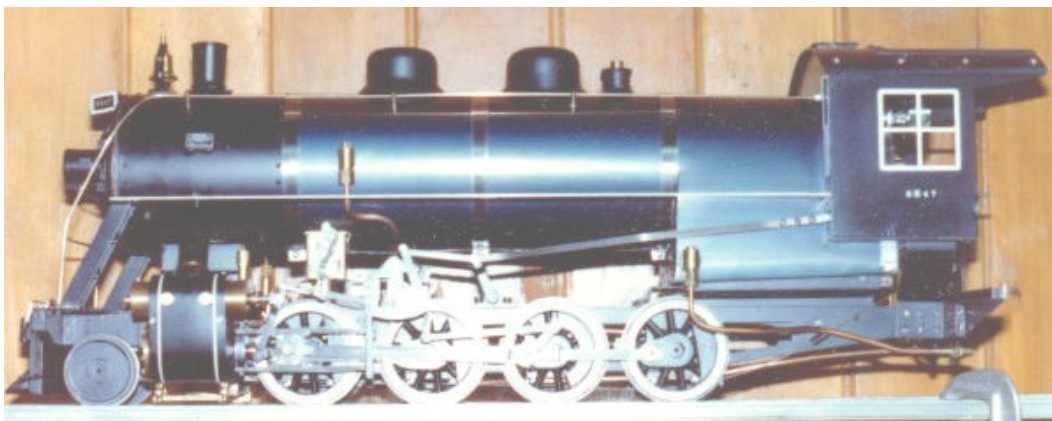
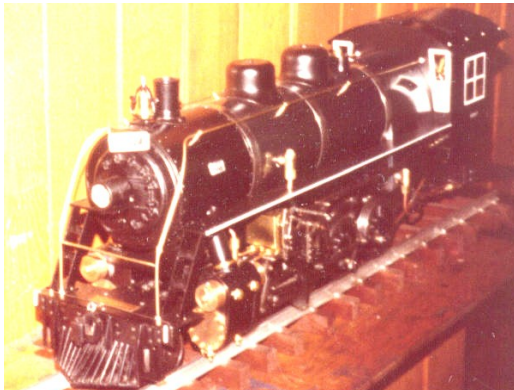

Ron writes: "This locomotive is a Martin Evans design built from the book "Caribou." I added the front pony truck, which was shown as an option. This version is called "Buffalo" in the book. It is equipped with Baker valve gear and piston valves. The large port areas to and from the cylinders make this a speedy engine even with the small drivers. It has quite a bit of pulling power and it was able to pull a train with nine adults at the local track. It's an easy steamer as it has a copper boiler and a large grate area. I originally built the boiler with a stainless steel outer wrapper, but that didn't work out too well. Adhesion of the silver solder to the outer shell was poor and leaks developed after numerous heat cycles."

(I personally like the CN front very much!)

If I've deciphered the text behind the Modeltec photo correctly, then they were built as follows: the UP 4-6-6-4 in 1954-60, the NKP 2-8-4 in 1962-67, and the C&O 2-6-6-6 in 1968-75.

The name? "Strom Minnesota" (once "Engineering") was founded by Strom in 1961. It's located on Wayzata Blvd. in Minnetonka MN, just down the road from Grays Bay.

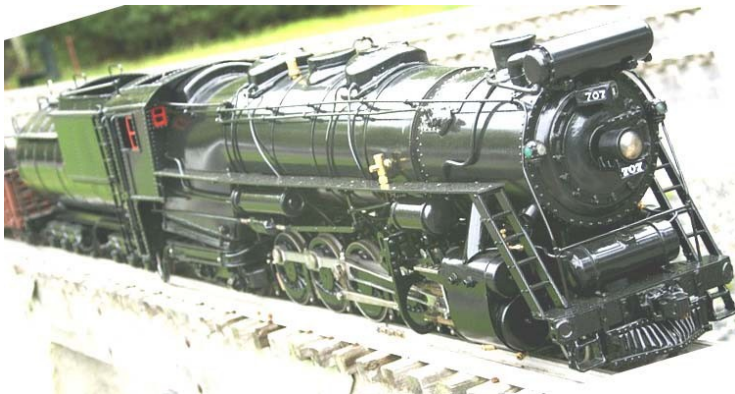

History, comments:

Donald A. Strom (1930-2019) built at least three big, modern locomotives. All three appear on one photo in the "Modeltec" issue of Jan. 1989. Apparently all are now at the Lake Superior Railroad Museum in Duluth. Nothing on its website, but the museum does sell a book on its collection. If I've deciphered the text behind the Modeltec photo correctly, then they were built as follows: the UP 4-6-6-4 in 1954-60, the NKP 2-8-4 in 1962-67, and the C&O 2-6-6-6 in 1968-75.

The name? "Strom Minnesota" (once "Engineering") was founded by Strom in 1961. It's located on Wayzata Blvd. in Minnetonka MN, just down the road from Grays Bay.
