

### History, comments:

Here's a new one for a model locomotive in North America: a Franco-Crosti boiler! The prototype are the ten 9Fs, 92020-29, built in Crewe for British Rail in 1955. The large barrel below the boiler (see the front shot) is essentially a feedwater heater running back as far as the front of the firebox. The very unique-looking Italien 2-8-0's had the heater barrels placed parallel on both sides of the regular boiler with no stack up front. British Rail had these heater barrels all blocked off by 1962.



### History, comments:

Bill Smith wrote on 7 May 2016: "The model I completed is essentially a Don Young designs Derby 2P using Don's drawings, castings and advice modified to represent a 1781 Series 'Belpaire'. The model is not sufficiently accurate to be given a series number. Most noticeable are driving wheels too small, Joy valve gear, and the loco has right hand drive as per Midland practice. These locos were built in 1902 and coupled to 4500 gal bogie tenders as the Midland did not begin to install track pans until 1903. The bogie tenders were then exchanged for regular 6-wheel-types - less weight to lug around.

The 2781-2790 series was renumbered 710-719 in 1907. The model is built to a scale of 20mm-ft. Don originally intended to submit a construction series to "Model Engineer" who in the 1970s were only accepting metric articles. The deal never materialised, but Don's drawings were too far advanced to change to Imperial - hence the anomaly.

The bogie tender of the model closely follows the Derby general arrangement drawing for the first Midland Compounds and is fitted with full brake rigging. The boiler was built in accordance with Alec Farmer's 'Model Loco Boiler Making', the barrel being rolled with a castellated longitudinal joint.

The loco is an excellent performer, but is at present being shopped for heavy repairs." Photo from Vancouver Island Model Engineers website, Nov. 2015
