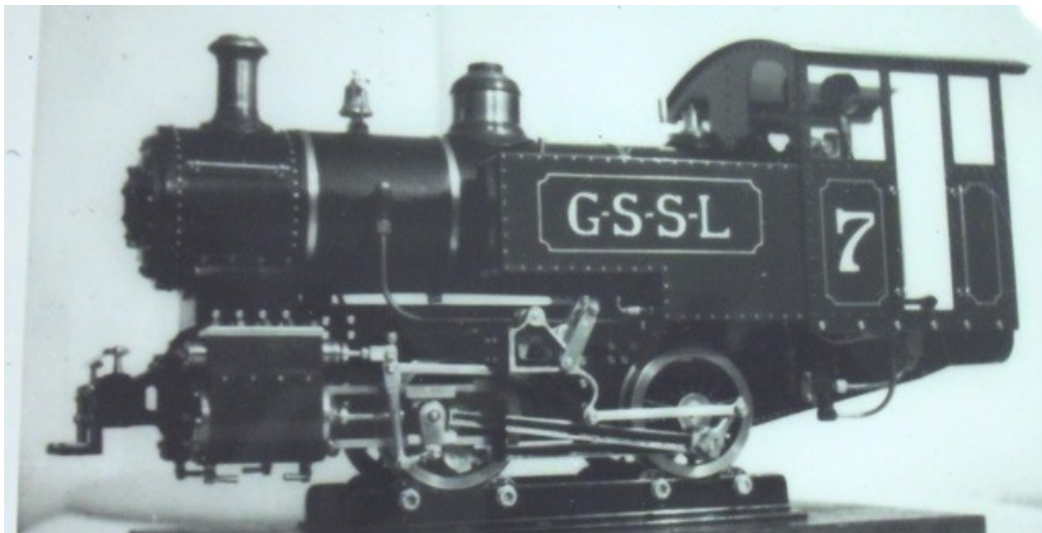
History, comments:

I recall seeing the completed loco running at my father's (Enos Yoder's) track in Sarasota FL around 1967. (That dual-gauge $\frac{3}{4}$ "-1" track was taken up in 1974.) I had seen this loco at the Peck residence around 1962 along with a "Virginia" listed here elsewhere and an uncompleted 4-cylinder 4-6-2.

Col. Peck, who received some notoriety in his later years as a sailor and "iconoclastic seafarer", was one of Florida's few $\frac{3}{4}$ " modelers.

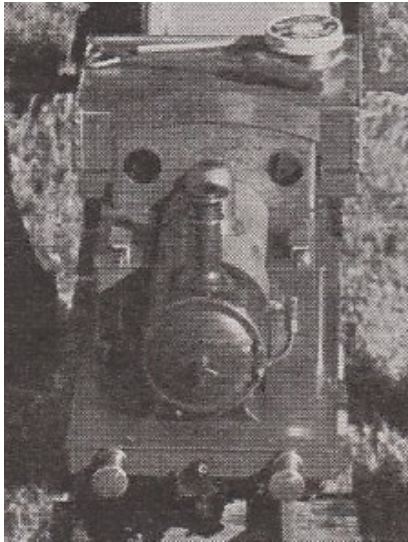

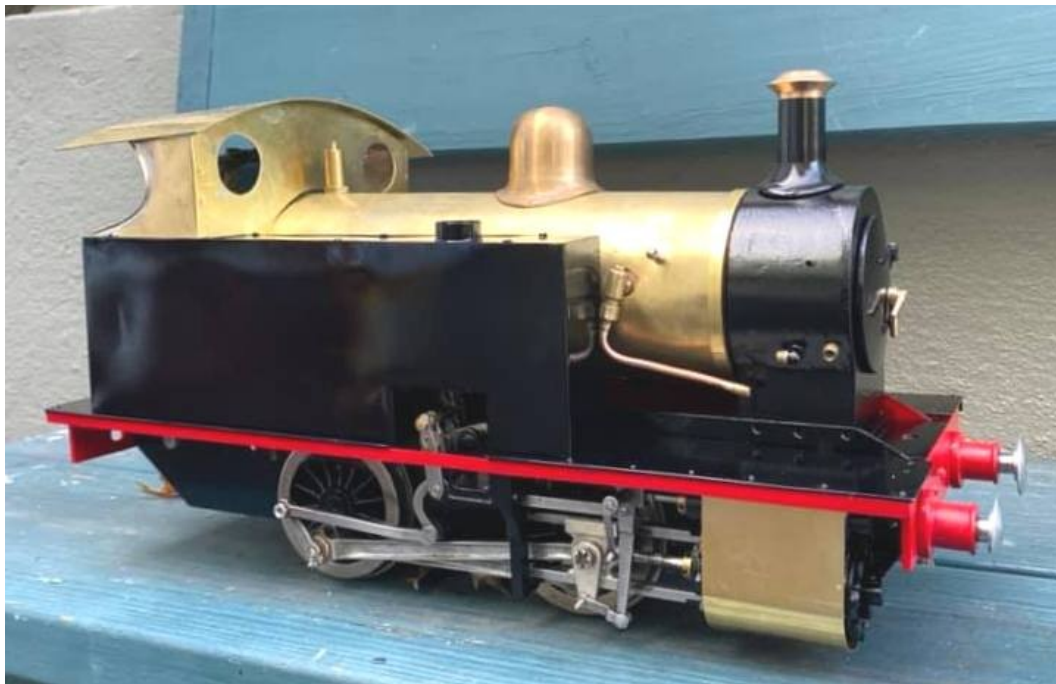

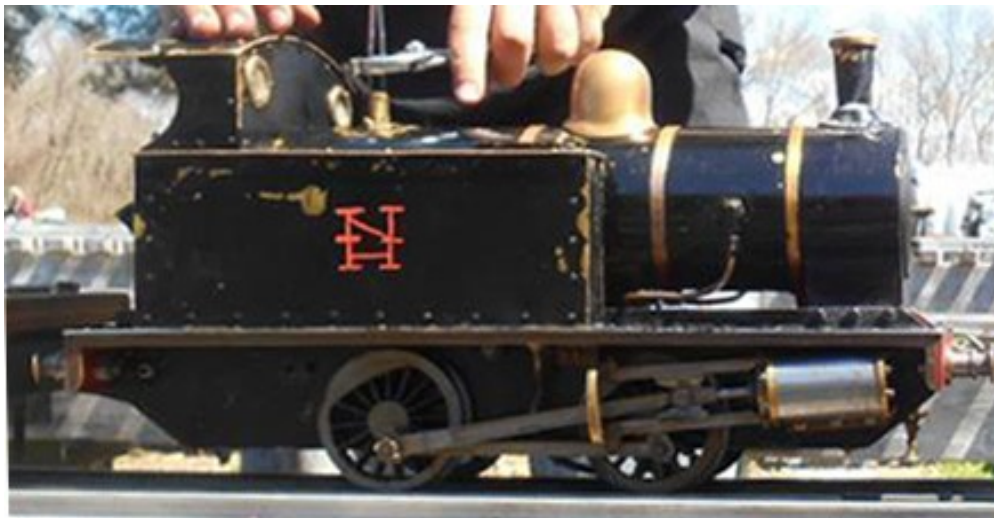

This is the highly-original rebuild of a Krauss 0-4-0T. The owner says it is modelled after Disneyland's 30"-gauge "Big Thunder Mountain" roller-coaster ride. He writes on Facebook: "Building a line that was integrated with the landscape was important to me. I put consideration into all my aesthetic choices. On the trackwork, I considered every detail from the color of the ties to the color of the rails. I painted the rails a rusty brown color for realism, and I chemically blacken all the track hardware. Because the railroad is prominently visible in the front yard, I decided it would serve me well to create an elegant and thoughtfully designed miniature landscape so the neighborhood community would find it to be an asset instead of a nuisance." Maschewitz also has a museum at San Mateo CA.

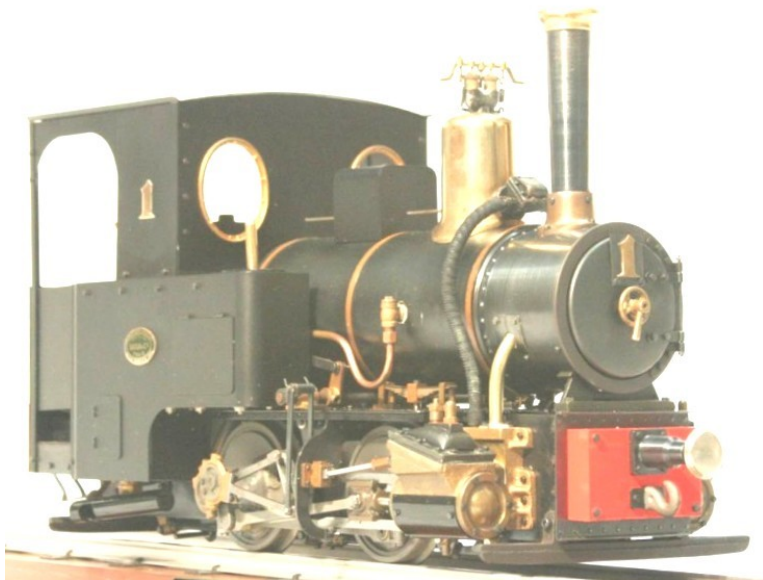

Steam Workshop writes: "This is a brand new, un-steamed, factory-built loco. There is an injector, an axle pump and a hand pump in the tank. Drain cocks are footplate-operated and lubrication is from a mechanical ratchet job under the front, with a beautifully discrete removable section of running board under the smoke box. The hand brake is a cool little ratchet lever on the footplate with a balance weight on it."

"The detail in all the lost wax castings is top notch, from the scale outside Stevenson's eccentric straps, the dome-mounted steam manifold, exquisite little safety valves, the cylinders and the crossheads. . . ."

"Although OS is still in business, they are no longer producing live-steam locos, so they are consequently pretty rare and collectible."
